The Liturgical Year Simple Facts, Deep Truths By: Father Thomas Richstatter, O.F.M

The Deep Meaning

The key to understanding the meaning of the liturgical year lies in the notion of "presence." We believe that Christ is truly present in the Eucharist under the appearance of bread and wine. We believe Christ "is present in His word, since it is He Himself who speaks when the holy scriptures are read in the Church (Constitution on the Liturgy, 7). And we believe that Christ is present in a special, mysterious way when we celebrate the liturgical

"Recalling the mysteries of redemption, the Church opens to the faithful the riches of the Lord's powers and merits, so that these are in some way made present in every age in order that the faithful may lay hold on them and be filled with saving grace" (Constitution on the Liturgy, 102, emphasis added).

The liturgy is very different from, for example, going to see a movie about World War II. Through the sights and sounds of the film, we can picture real or imaginary events that took place at that time. But when we celebrate the mysteries of Christ during the course of the liturgical year, we do not merely recall past events. The liturgy enables us to pass from our chronological time (past/present/future) and to enter into God's "time of salvation" so that we, through grace and mystery, become present to the event.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church affirms: "We must continue to accomplish in ourselves the stages of Jesus' life and his mysteries....For it is the plan of the Son of God to make us and the whole Church partake in his mysteries" (#521, quoting St. John Eudes).



Our Lord Jesus Christ the King

Today's Readings: Ezekiel 34:11-12, 15-17; Psalm 23:1-3, 5-6; 1 Corinthians 15:20-26, 28; Matthew 25:31-46

WHATEVER YOU DID FOR THESE LEAST ONES, YOU DID FOR ME

Our Gospel for this Sunday is Matthew's account of the Last Judgment, when Jesus says that the Son of Man will be present at the end of time to separate the sheep from the goats, those who cared for "the least ones" from those who did not. In this Gospel Jesus seems to identify himself with the king and judge as well as with the least ones who were in need.

In contrast, the first reading and the psalm depict God in the role of shepherd. Here it is God who is tending the injured, the strayed, the sick, and the lost. This is what Jesus did throughout his life and by his death. He cared for the hungry, the thirsty, the naked, the ill, and the stranger. He bought freedom for all. Jesus is asking no more and no less from us. The nations will be judged on one criterion only: whether we imitated the compassion of God that was revealed to us in Jesus, whether we recognized the suffering face of Jesus in the least ones and responded with love.



- 5) it gives us a special strength of the Holy Spirit to spread and defend the faith by word and action as true witnesses of Christ, to confess the name of Christ boldly, and never to be ashamed of the Cross.

Because Confirmation perfects our baptism, we are obliged to receive it "in due time." Any Catholic who did not receive Confirmation at baptism or as part of his religious education during grade school or high school should contact a priest and arrange to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation.
